FOREWORD

The proposed changes to Section 5.2.2.1.4 and Table 5-1 reflect modifications to the text to accurately depict the material under consideration in Table 5-1. This is accomplished in part by substituting the word "steel" for "metal." The modifications to Table 5-1, by changing one category to "Nominal Stud Size" and deleting "Gauge of Stud," are necessary as a matter of coordination and consistency with steel industry standard terminology and dimensional designations as well as coordination with the national model building codes and standards. The changes to the note below Table 5-1 remove the inconsistency that was present between the note and the category "Gauge of Stud" and insert in its place language that is consistent with current industry standards and terminology.

Change 5.2.2.1.4 as indicated below.

5.2.2.1.4 Metal-Steel Stud Walls. The thermal transmittance of frame walls that contain <u>metal steel</u> stud assemblies shall be calculated using a series path procedure that corrects for parallel paths, as presented in Equations 5-3 and 5-4.

POLICY STATEMENT DEFINING ASHRAE'S CONCERN FOR THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF ITS ACTIVITIES
